A FRESH PERSPECTIVE ON THE SUNDAY READINGS

HIS WORD TODAY by Rev. William J. Reilly
Thirteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time
July 1, 2018

"But God formed man to be imperishable; the image of his own nature he made him. But by the envy of the devil, death entered the world, and they who belong to his company experience it...He took the child by the hand and said to her... 'Little girl, I say to you arise!' The girl a child of twelve, arose immediately and walked around. At this they were utterly amazed."

We have been told from the first book of the bible that we are made in the image and likeness of God. We have been offered the gift of life and we strive to preserve life in all its forms. The late Cardinal Bernardin of Chicago called us to have a 'consistent ethic of life.' He teaches us as Catholics that we are opposed to abortion, capital punishment, nuclear war and euthanasia. Were he alive today, I am sure he would include immigration. Why?

These are signs today of the envy of the devil who introduced death into our world. Respect for life is respect for rights. The denial of these rights is the work of the devil. As we admire the compassion of Jesus for the little girl of twelve, so we are called to defend the rights of the unborn, victims of injustice and the elderly.

Only when we respond to the evils around us will we return to live in the image of his own nature. Now is the time.

This Wednesday we celebrate one of the greatest feasts of our nation – Independence Day. On July 4, 1776 in Philadelphia, the forefathers of our nation, declared a young American nation free from tyranny, excessive taxation, and oppressive rules. Simply, our forefathers wished the nation to be free, and have its liberties. A mix-matched group of men went to battle to fight for the cause of this freedom which was the ideal testament to their faith in God and liberty.

Because of our forefathers' effort, nowadays we are blessed to live in a country that provides its people with freedom and opportunity, to freely worship God. Do we sufficiently reflect on the freedom that we have and the gift of democracy in which we are able to worship God?

This country was founded with moral principle and with respect of the Almighty. From the Declaration of Independence: "all men are created equal, that they are endowed by the Creator with certain unalienable Rights". In the Preamble of that same document that was passed on July 4, 1776, it states that the rights and opinions are entitled by God. In 1791, the first Amendment to the Constitution granted everyone right to the free exercise of religion.

Religion and respect of God has always been a hallmark of our country. In recognition of the Supreme Creator, God is found in our documents, in our courtrooms, and even on our money.

God is the genesis not only of the world and our lives, but also the basis of moral norms in which our laws are designated and enacted. About this importance of moral norms and religions in our lives, noted two significant leaders of our national independent movement: Thomas Jefferson and George Washington.

Thomas Jefferson, the author of the Declaration of Independence, wrote a letter in 1787 to his nephew in which he stated: The moral sense, or conscience, is as much a part of man as his leg or arm... It may be strengthened by exercise, as may any particular limb of the body". He continued to advise his nephew to read the Old and New Testaments and said: "lose no occasion of exercising your dispositions to be humane, to be true, just, firm, orderly, and courageous... consider every act of this kind as exercise which will strengthen your moral faculties and increase your worth".

George Washington, who served the colonies as its General, and the young nation as its first President, said in his farewell address in 1796: "of all the dispositions and habits which lead to political prosperity, religion and morality are indispensable supports... In vain would that man claim the tribute of patriotism, who should labor to subvert these great pillars of human happiness, these firmest props of the duties of men and citizens". Washington also said, "Believing as I do that religion and morality are the essential pillars of civil society".

Today, many of those beliefs of old are challenged, and disregarded. We have seen through the course of time, people lose their interest in religion and do not participate. Families used to make Church part of their Sunday, but now it has been replaced by sports and other recreation, even some leaders of our nation seem to ignore religious values. So when we make plans for summer vacation, we shouldn't misuse our freedom to worship, by neglecting God and Church. We should arrange time for God and for the Church as priority this summer, for our moral fabric is enhanced by the worship and relationship that we have with God.

As we celebrate Independence Day, let us thank God for the Rights he has given us by our great forefathers, and let us reflect on the meaning of Freedom, especially religious freedom. In this Independence weekend may we raise our voices in thanksgiving for our freedom and for other gifts from God, and declare ourselves in favor of prayer for our great nation and its leaders.
