■ **MAKE A NEW YEAR RESOLUTION HAPPEN—IT'S TIME TO MAKE A SPIRITUAL RETREAT**

Is there a slowing down for you after the first of the year? Was that one of your New Year's Resolutions to which you never got around? There are two opportunities to take: one for the women of the parish at the end of **January (27-29) at St. Clare's Retreat Center in Soquel, near Santa Cruz, CA. The annual Men's Retreat will take place at San Damiano Retreat House in Danville, March 3-5.**

Fr. Joseph Kim, Director of Vocations for the Diocese of San Jose, will lead the Women's Retreat. This year's theme: **Keys to Spiritual Freedom.**

Jesuit Fr. John Endres of the Jesuit School of Theology will lead the Men's Retreat. This year's theme: **The Psalms: God's Love Endures Forever.**

Like most things spiritual, doing something about our spiritual life is a desire and wish that lingers on, but we just don't get around to do anything about it.

Maybe five percent of Catholics have made a spiritual retreat for a day or a weekend. I have often led retreats, and I can tell from listening to skeptics who finally experienced a retreat that it suddenly became one of the greatest experiences of their lives, and they wondered, asking themselves, why they waited so long?

Oh, there is not just enough time? Oh, we have something that weekend already scheduled. I remember a statement from the famous St. Augustine of the late fourth century: when we have material things, we think they will make us happy and they don't; when we think about spiritual life, we put aside as a someday thing, but when we do, our inner souls are touched in profound ways.

Over the years, what I have noticed about the spiritual life is that **many Catholics are content to settle for the minimum;** it

is also true of deeper and more authentic human relationships. It is also true for learning about Catholicism, modern church thinking, expanding the horizons of the Catholic spiritual tradition, the social justice tradition and, in general, with a deeper living of life.

So you will read this article and say to yourself: well that was certainly interesting, and let the opportunity go by again, or will you?

For each of the retreats, there is a team of parishioners who organize the retreat, choose its theme, find a religious leader to lead it, take care of all the details except for the cooking, and keep the weekend going from beginning to end. And what is most important, **the teams prepare also by praying for you**, and are ready to welcome you, who may be hesitating, knowing that it's up to God to invite you and up to you to respond.

■ **MATTHEW'S GOSPEL: TO GET US INTO THE MIND AND HEART OF JESUS**

We continue this week to explore the gospel tradition of St. Matthew, which is the Gospel that we will read for most of this year.

Matthew is not just telling stories about Jesus' words. Matthew makes the Epiphany story the heart of his gospel tradition: that the Emmanuel God is always with us and that Jesus is calling us to love as God loves. There are no outsiders. All are insiders when it comes to God. God opens the doors of Judaism and God's covenant to everyone, regardless of race. There is no pure race favored by God. Equality, respect and acceptance replace indifference and any spirit of separation.

Managing life by placing people in comfortable little clumps is not the way that God has created his people and his children. Jesus will not let us restrict God's attitudes and perceptions. Everyone is chosen by God.

"Be children of your heavenly Father, for he makes his sun rise on the bad and good, and causes rain to fall on the just and the unjust." (Matthew 5:45)

Jesus was misunderstood and rejected by those closest to him, and such will be the fate of anyone instructed in the Kingdom of Heaven. Matthew understands Jesus as calling each follower to have the extraordinary quality of being exceptional and different, being more like Jesus rather than less like Jesus.

The purpose of a Gospel is to get us into the mind and heart of Jesus, not just to tell a story about the actions of a good man. The purpose of a gospel is more than just to admire it. It is to live it.

Matthew admits that living the gospel of Jesus in a real way will cause dissension and disappointment among families and friends.

One of the virtues that Matthew encourages is the virtue of practicing forgiveness toward those who offend or hurt one another. This, of course, is a very human problem and prompts the questions about its frequency, to which Jesus responds, "not seven times, but seventy-seven times."

There are demands if we are going to be a Catholic and a Christian, according to Matthew.

The gospel contains five main discourses of teaching sections:

1. The Sermon on the Mount, Chapter 5-7
2. Chapter 13 that describes the attributes of the Kingdom of Heaven
3. Chapter 18 that focuses on the qualities of those who are part of such a community

In the end, Matthew says, the followers of Jesus, to be true to their master, need to practice trust in God and trust in the community of the church, and to continue to be true to their mission of God expressed in Jesus.

■ **PRAYER AND FASTING AS THE INAUGURATION APPROACHES**

This Thursday, January 20, is Inauguration Day. In response to divisions that emerged from the presidential campaign and in support of healing and hope for the country, Bishop Gerald Barnes of the Diocese of San Bernardino has asked his parishes to participate in a one-day fast during these final days leading up to the inauguration of Donald Trump as the 45th President of the United States. He notes, “It is meant as a show of support for our country. It’s a prayer that the United States succeeds in its principles, for the benefit of all.” As they fast, parishioners are encouraged to pray for the country and that the presidency of Donald Trump will promote human life and dignity, and the common good.

I thought that this would be an idea to extend to our parish this week. Below is a list of readings that can be used if you wish to participate in a day of prayer and fasting:

- Monday, January 16: Esther 4:3, 16
- Tuesday, January 17: Judith 4:9-13
- Wednesday, January 18: Tobit 12:8
- Thursday, January 20: Ezra 9:21-23

And here is a prayer we can all pray this week, adapted from the prayer used by Archbishop John Carroll at the inauguration of George Washington in 1789:

Almighty and eternal God, you have revealed your glory to all nations. God of power and might, wisdom and justice, through you authority is rightly administered, laws are enacted, and judgment is decreed. Assist with your spirit of counsel and fortitude the President of these United States, that his administration may be conducted in righteousness, and be eminently useful to your people over whom he presides. May he encourage due respect for virtue and religion. May he execute the laws with justice and mercy. May he seek to restrain crime, vice, and immorality. We likewise commend to your unbounded mercy all citizens of the United States, that we be blessed in the knowledge and sanctified in the observance of your holy law. May we be preserved in union and that peace which the world cannot give; and,

after enjoying the blessings of this life, be admitted to those which are eternal. We pray to you, who are Lord and God, for ever and ever.

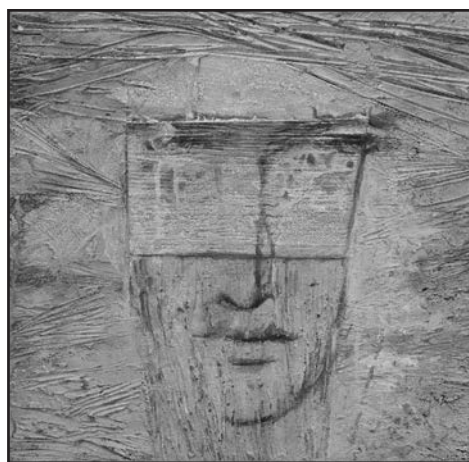
Icons in Transformation showcases the paintings of Russian artist Ludmila Pawlowska in her only Bay Area appearance.

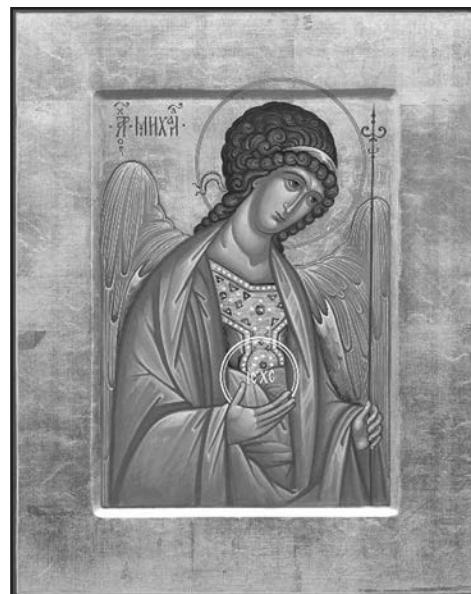

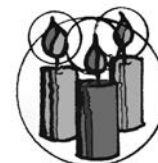


Traditional icon from the Vassilevsky Monastery in Suzdal, Russia

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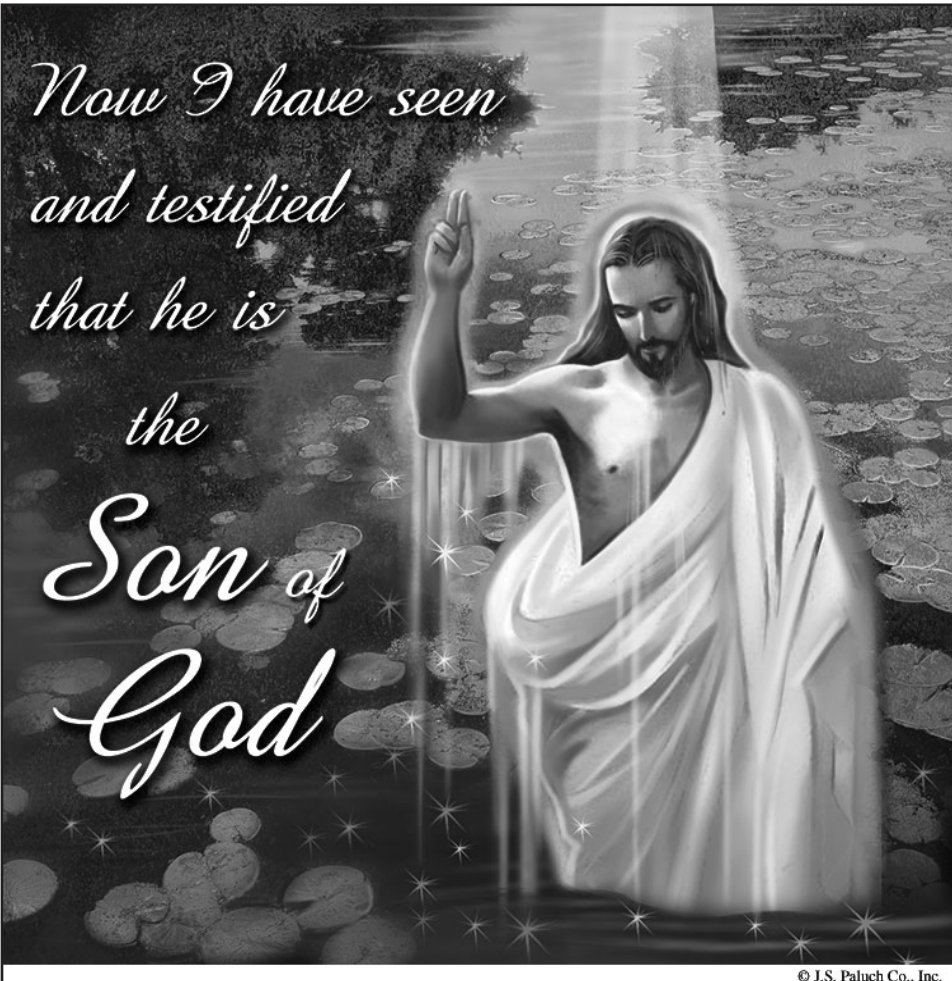

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■ **HAGA QUE UNA RESOLUCION DEL NUEVO AÑO SUCEDA- ES HORA DE HACER UN RETIRO ESPIRITUAL.**

Esta usted un poco despacio después del Año Nuevo? ¿Es esta una de sus resoluciones que nunca llego hacerla? Hay dos oportunidades para hacerlo: uno **para las mujeres** de la parroquia a finales de **enero (27-29) en el centro de retiros de Santa Clara en Soquel, cerca de Santa Cruz, CA. Retiro de hombres anual se llevará a cabo en la casa de retiro San Damiano en Danville, marzo 3-5.**

El Padre Joseph Kim, Director de vocaciones de la diócesis de San José será el líder del retiro de las mujeres. El tema de este año: **Las Llaves a la Libertad Espiritual. El padre Jesuita John Endres** de la escuela Jesuita de Teología llevará el retiro de hombres. El tema de este año: **los Salmos: El amor de Dios Permanece por Siempre.**

Como la mayoría de las cosas: hacer algo sobre nuestra vida espiritual es un deseo y deseo que persiste pero que simplemente no llegamos a hacer nada al respecto.

Tal vez cinco por ciento de los católicos han hecho un retiro espiritual por un día o un fin de semana. Muchas veces yo he dirigido retiros, y puedo decir que después de escuchar a los escépticos que finalmente experimentaron un retiro que fue una de las mejores experiencias de su vida, y se preguntaban, por qué esperamos tanto tiempo.

¿Oh, no hay suficiente tiempo? Oh, que tenemos algo ese fin de semana ya programado. Recuerdo una declaración del famoso San Agustín, de finales del siglo cuarto: cuando tenemos cosas materiales, pensamos nos harán felices y no lo hacen; Cuando pensamos en la vida espiritual, ponemos a un lado como una cosa que algún día, pero cuando lo hacemos, nuestras almas interiores son tocadas de manera profunda.

Con los años, lo que he notado acerca de la vida espiritual es que muchos **católicos son contentos y se conforman con lo mínimo**; también es verdad una más profundas y más auténticas

relación humana. Es también el tiempo para aprender acerca del catolicismo, iglesia moderna, pensando, ampliando los horizontes de la tradición espiritual católica, la tradición de justicia social y, en general, con una vida más profunda de la vida.

■ **EL EVANGELIO DE MATEO: PARA ENTRAR EN LA MENTE Y EL CORAZÓN DE JESÚS**

Continuamos esta semana para explorar la tradición del Evangelio de San Mateo que es el evangelio que vamos a leer para la mayor parte de este año.

Mateo no está sólo contando historias acerca de las palabras de Jesús. Mateo hace la historia de Epifanía el corazón de la tradición del Evangelio: que el Dios Emmanuel está siempre con nosotros y que Jesús nos llama a amar como Dios ama. No hay forasteros. Todos son iguales cuando se trata de Dios. Dios abre las puertas del Judaísmo y todos son importantes sin distinción de raza. No hay ninguna raza pura favorecida por Dios. Igualdad, respeto y aceptación reemplazan indiferencia y ningún espíritu de separación.

Organizando la vida mediante la colocación de personas en grupos no para lo

que Dios ha creado a su pueblo y a sus hijos. Jesús no nos restringirá las actitudes y percepciones de Dios. Cada uno es elegido por Dios.

“Ser hijos de nuestro Padre Celestial, que hace que su sol alumbre sobre los malos y buenos, y provoca la lluvia sobre los justos y los injustos.” (Mateo 5:45)

Jesús fue incomprendido y rechazado por los más cercanos a él y tal será el destino de cualquiera instruido en el Reino de los cielos. Mateo entiende a Jesús como llama a cada seguidor a tener la extraordinaria cualidad de ser excepcional y diferente, ser más como Jesús en vez de ser menos como Jesús.

El propósito de un evangelio es para que lleguemos nosotros a la mente y el corazón de Jesús no sólo para contar una historia acerca de las acciones de un buen hombre. El propósito de un evangelio no es solo para admirarlo. Es para vivirlo.

Mateo admite que vivir el Evangelio de Jesús de una manera real causará disensión y decepción entre las familias y amigos.

Una de las virtudes que Mateo se enfoca es la virtud de practicar el perdón hacia los que ofenden o lastiman a otros. Por supuesto, esto es un problema muy humano y tenemos que hacernos la pregunta acerca de cuantas veces, a las que Jesús responde, “no siete veces, sino setenta veces siete.”

De acuerdo a Mateo tenemos demandas si vamos a ser Católicos y cristianos.

El evangelio contiene cinco secciones de enseñanza:

1. El Sermón de la Montaña, Capitulo 5-7
2. Capítulo 13 que describe los atributos del Reino de los Cielos
3. Capítulo 18 que se enfoca en las cualidades de los que son parte de esa comunidad

Al final, Mateo dice, los seguidores de Jesús, necesitan practicar la confianza en Dios y la confianza en la comunidad de la iglesia, y de continuar siendo sinceros a la misión que Dios expreso en Jesús.
