One Life at a Time

A woman wore her Precious Feet lapel pin to the local library. A 16-year-old girl saw it and asked what it was. When the woman explained that they were the exact size and shape of an unborn baby's feet at 10 weeks the 16-year-old was shocked. She was pregnant and was considering abortion. After seeing the Precious Feet she realized the truth and chose adoption instead.

Daily the pastor would pray for the conversion of the abortion clinic worker. When he saw her in the community he let her know that he was doing so. The clinic employee scoffed and rebuffed the pastor. Undaunted, he continued to pray. Slowly, God chipped away at the clinic worker's hardened heart and the reality of what she was doing began to sink in. One day the pastor's little daughter asked the woman if she would go to church with them. Miraculously, she said yes and ended up leaving the abortion industry shortly thereafter.

A woman was doing her laundry at the local laundromat when she ran across a little flyer that someone had left on a table. Bored, she picked it up and began reading. It was called, "Milestones of Early Life" and it talked about the developing unborn child. At 21 days the heart begins to beat, at 9 weeks the baby sucks her thumb. The woman was profoundly moved. With shaking hands she clutched the pamphlet as she called the abortion clinic to cancel her appointment for the next morning.

Guided by Faith

After successful career in sales, Packers assistant David Raih found his way back to football

GREEN BAY — Packers offensive assistant David Raih (pronounced “rye”) keeps a note in his Lambeau Field office. It reads “God will not bless what you do not do. God blesses doers.”

Subscribing to this message has worked for Raih, now in his second year in Green Bay. Guided by faith, he has followed his instincts and taken risks on a journey from an unfulfilling path to the NFL.

Raih, 35, grew up in Edina, Minn., as the fourth eldest of five boys in a very athletic family. His father, Tom, an orthopedic surgeon from humble beginnings who coached his sons in youth sports, scored more than 1,000 points as a college basketball player. His mother, Mollie, a teacher, was a Rocky Mountain ski instructor.

Raih attended Catholic schools, including St. Thomas Academy in St. Paul, where he was a standout high school quarterback and a member of the Cadets’ state championship basketball team as a junior. His prep success on the gridiron

led him to the University of Iowa to play for the Hawkeyes. He climbed the depth chart to become the backup quarterback in Iowa City. Unfortunately, his college career was cut short due to an injury to his throwing arm. “My career is not a big injury story,” said Raih. “That (college) was the best I was going to be. It was difficult. I had been playing since I was in the fourth grade. When anything ends, it’s tough.”

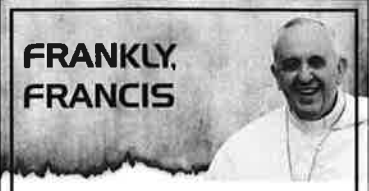
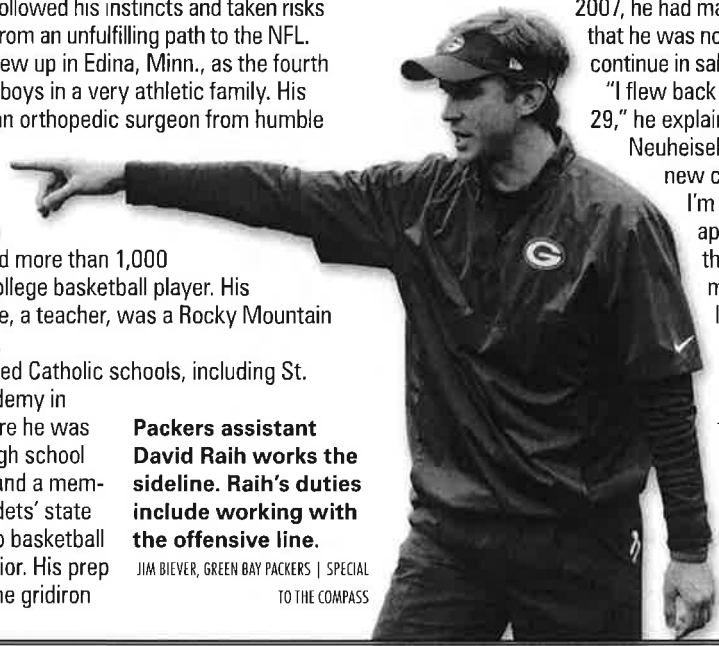
Raih graduated with a degree in finance and received a job offer.

When Raih returned to Minnesota for Christmas in 2007, he had made up his mind that he was not going to continue in sales.

“I flew back to LA on Dec. 29,” he explained. “Rick Neuheisel is hired as the new coach at UCLA.

I’m sitting in my apartment and the announcement is made. I immediately stood up. I was going to do whatever it took to get into coaching.”

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Just in time for papal visit, Pope Francis House completed

ALLOUEZ — What would Elizabeth Gomez and Alberto Castro say to Pope Francis if they had the opportunity?

“Dear Pope Francis, we are very grateful and thankful to God to receive a home that has been built in your honor. We want you to know that we always keep you in our prayers.”

It was a picture-perfect Sunday morning Sept. 13 as Bishop David Ricken offered God’s blessings upon the Castro-Gomez family and

their brand new home on Green Bay’s east side.

Officially, this is Home #86 built by the Greater Green Bay Habitat for Humanity.

But there is far more to the story. Last May, the ground was broken on the 1,094-square-foot three-bedroom house, which will always be known as the “Pope Francis House.”

An unexpected contact last year started the wheels in motion on the Pope Francis House. An anonymous donor had selected Green Bay as one of the many Habitat for Humanity communities where over the past couple of years

a donation of \$60,000 toward a Habitat home has been made in honor of Pope Francis.

It is obvious that Habitat for Humanity’s mission statement struck a chord with the person who has chosen to make these nationwide donations, said Cora Haltaufderheid, executive director of the Green Bay Area Habitat for Humanity. She noted that about 10 Habitat homes will be built around the country in honor of Pope Francis in 2015.

about St. Francis of Assisi

1 Francis, whose feast day is Oct. 4, was born in Assisi in either 1181 or 1182. He died there on Oct. 3, 1226.

2 He was baptized "Giovanni" (John in Italian). Later, his father started calling him "Francesco," which meant "Frenchman."

3 Francis founded the Order of Friars Minor (now called the Franciscans) and the Poor Clares (along with St. Clare).

4 He wanted to be a knight and went to war twice: once he was captured and ransomed; the second time, he was turned back by a dream from God.

5 His love of animals has many tales, including preaching to a flock of birds. It was immortalized in a painting by Giotto di Bondone: "The Sermon of the Birds" in the Basilica of St. Francis of Assisi.

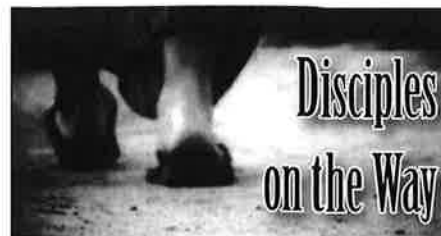
KEEPING SUNDAY HOLY

The highest and most important form of prayer is the Sunday Mass. This is not just a suggestion; this is absolutely necessary to sustain us in our faith. The church requires Sunday Mass attendance under the pain of sin, because the Lord himself requires that we "keep holy the Lord's day."

I recommend that you read the Gospel for the coming Sunday together at home before Sunday Mass so you will be prepared to understand and to enter more deeply into the beauty of the Sunday Mass. The coming Sunday's Gospel reading you can easily find online at the U.S. bishops' conference website, www.usccb.org. When you give God the first hours of the first day of the week, Sunday,



everything else will begin to fall in proper order. This will also help to encourage you and your family to rest and enjoy time together before the week begins and the busy pace of life picks up again. One very simple way to encourage greater reverence for Sunday and the need for sacred rest is to limit "screen" time, whether it is on the television, computer or smart devices. Instead, try to observe some times for silence, reading and prayer or enjoy some time outside walking or just being together and talking.
