

- Easter lambs recall both the Passover lambs and Jesus, "the Lamb of God."
- 2 Rebbits, which can produce a litter a month, traditionally begin mating around the spring equinox. That was also when pagan Anglo-Saxons celebrated their goddess of spring, Eostre. (She had a hare as a companion.)
- Easter chicks come from hard-shelled, tomb-like eggs, but also remind us of St. Peter and the cock that crowed.
- Butterflies spring from tomb-like chrysalises or cocoons, reminding us of the resurrected Christ.

descriptions of the geographical parameters of your parish and this will be very helpful for the present and future, especially as we prepare to launch the "New Evangelization" in 2020.

Pope Francis calls on a renewal of "missionary discipleship" (Evangelii Gaudium). As Jesus sent his followers to spread the Gospel message, the Word of God challenges us as believers to "go forth" into

our communities and be involved directly in spreading the love of Christ.

By doing this, we are able to ensure that as a diocese, we are considering all the people of God without gaps or areas of unaccountability. As Pope Francis continues to proclaim, we are called to be in a "permanent state of mission" and by the refining and affirming of geographic service areas, we can continue this call as noted in Canon 518. "Pastors assume responsibility for the care of all souls within a specified geographic area."

In the past, boundaries were used as a means to direct people where they cannot

worship or become a member. I do not want the boundaries to be used in this way. Rather, in the light of the "New Evangelization" and our mission to enhance discipleship in our households, schools and parishes, let us look to seize this opportunity by allowing our defined boundaries to become parameters of our "mission field." It is here in our neighborhoods that we ought to be reaching out first to offer all the people within our mission field the joy and the mercy of the Gospel, just as Jesus did.

Along with the boundaries opportunity, we will begin using a software program called, "MissionInsite." This program provides demographics and lifestyle and religious belief information for those who reside in your neighborhood. Together, the parish boundary information and the "MissionInsite" program will assist us greatly as we launch the "New Evangelization" in 2020.

Over time, all of us in pastoral leadership and all of you, our parishioners, can be very missionary by reaching out to our own neighborhood within the parish boundaries far more effectively than ever before. We will also, over the next period of time, be looking at ways to engage our virtual neighborhoods more vigorously, which are also very important.

What wonderful opportunities lie before us! Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, today and forever. His mission continues through us today!

Dear Parishioners,

I would like to share my thanks to each one of you for your support of the Gala and Electric Moment. To Lisa Mueller, Tracey Allen and Kathy Engeldinger-Kerwin, thank you taking on the monumental task of chairing the Gala. It was a special evening bringing very community together with a common focus - the students at St. John Bosco. With everyone contributing items. organizing the participating and donating, the Gala brought in \$31,754 after expenses.

This money is necessary for our general overall budget. Thank you.



The Electric Moment project, Creative Sprits – Creative Souls, was certainly exciting when we began with our kick off in August. With the initial donation of \$15,000 from the Fifth Quarter (Casey and Nicole

Rabach) their December Challenge we were headed in the right direction. A grant from the Packer Foundation, stock from Greg and Mary Anderson, stock from Mike and Janet Peters all helped to meet the December Challenge bringing our fundraising to \$45,000. But grants did not come in at the pace from the previous year and donations were I struggled with finding matches for the Electric Moment and was beginning to wonder if this project would take 2 years to complete. For several months, I had been concerned about the project and the stalemate we had. Finally, we were blessed, and had the good fortune to have two \$20,000 matches

in place on the Thursday before the Gala. They both arrived within 30 minutes of one another. Casey and Nicole Rabach

and an anonymous couple each generously shared their gifts with us. Many kind, charitable, people contributed to meet the matches but we initially would have fallen short had it not been for the generosity of Errico and Patrizia Auricchio. They believed in this project and stalwartly

believe kids should spend time outside in the fresh air and sunshine socializing, being creative and being physically active. Their donation put us within reach of the \$235,000 goal. We still have some monies to bring in (\$20,000) but are so much closer than before. Spring break for me was spent doing detailed work on the project, getting together a timeline, finalizing details and securing contractors. The project will begin June 1st. The students will have a wonderful, memorable, playground and outdoor education center in fall due to the contributions of many. Thank you for supporting our school in so many ways and believing Catholic education is the foundation of our church and our communities. With you, we are shaping future leaders by providing academic excellence in a caring 4K - 8 Catholic environment where God's gifts are nurtured and where faith is put into action. Mrs. Dassler
